Today's Gospel Reading: Matthew 22: 1-14

Hear the Gospel of Christ Glory to Christ our Saviour.

Then the Pharisees went and plotted to entrap him in what he said.

So they sent their disciples to him, along with the Herodians, saying:

'Teacher, we know that you are sincere, and teach the way of God in accordance with truth, and show deference to no one; for you do not regard people with partiality. Tell us, then,

what you think. Is it lawful to pay taxes to the emperor, or not?'

But Jesus, aware of their malice, said, 'Why are you putting me to the test, you

hypocrites? Show me the coin used for the tax.'

And they brought him a denarius.

Then he said to them, 'Whose head is this, and whose title?'

They answered, 'The emperor's.'

Then he said to them, 'Give therefore to the emperor the things that are the emperor's, and to God the things that are God's.'

When they heard this, they were amazed; and they left him and went away.

This is the Gospel of the Lord Praise to you O Christ.

Reflection

I hope by now you may have seen and heard about *Reset the Debt*¹. Four denominations including our own are calling on the Government to create a new 'Jubilee Fund' to provide grants to pay off and cancel unavoidable debt accrued by the poorest households during the lockdown period, giving them a more stable platform from which to face the difficult winter ahead. Of course, were our Government to heed this call, the cost would need to be met, most likely through the taxes we all pay, (and which some Global companies *should* be made to pay), and indeed, we might be asked to pay more. And some of us would willingly give more and some of us would oppose such a move.

Tax: who pays how much, who gets a cut, who gets a rise? This is, and perhaps always will be a hot potato. Money, *my* money, *my* earnings, how easily it becomes the golden calf, an idol made by human hands to which we bend our knee.

Historically there has always been a sense of discomfort for folk around the idea of mixing the realms of politics and religion. Politics: of the people, public life, money, power relations. Religion: the belief in and worship of God. And the discomfort somehow lies in the fact that what I believe about policy and praxis, justice, equality and fairness, may not be what you believe about those things. And we Christians run a mile from disagreement ...so then KAPOW! ... a holy war breaks out! (Oh, and God is on my side!)

But how can we possibly imagine that politics and religion could exist apart? Watching the news this week: stories concerning people deemed no longer 'viable' and told to simply 'retrain', or noting that another contract² has been handed out without tender to a company linked to Government ministers and advisors...watching, I simply cannot prize apart what Jesus teaches me about Gospel values from the political decisions and policy of the day. If we believe in a God who became one of us through the incarnation, how can we come to any conclusion other than that our common life is religious! So tell us teacher – what do you think?

Jesus and the devout Jews he addresses in this Gospel story did not have the luxury of imagining that politics and religion were separate. The situation within which they lived out their faith, was under a brutal, oppressive Roman occupation. They were buried under mountains of unpayable debt, suffering as they lost their land, their income, their livelihoods. Their fervent prayer was for a Messiah to come and save them.

Now, the Herodians collaborated with Rome by supporting the rule of the puppet king Herod, hence their name. The Pharisees, tended to accept Roman rule as a necessary evil and advised submission, providing the Romans didn't interfere with their practice of

religion. Many others, including the Zealots simply wanted Rome out...they fought against their oppressors, plotting revolution. Rome's response to it all was to demand submission through enforced taxes and brutal punishments, including, crucifixion on a cross. So paying your taxes was a matter of life or death! And the special coin used to pay tax displayed the image of Caesar, who believed himself divine. For Jews, simply handling this money was offensive and idolatrous.

The Temple exists right in the middle of this highly charged, politicised reality. And the Pharisees and the Herodians work together because they are both opposed to Jesus: they see Jesus as both a political *and* a religious threat. Tell us teacher ...is it religiously lawful to pay taxes to the pagan empire? If the answer comes yes, then Jesus must be a collaborator. If the answer comes 'no' – he's a zealot causing trouble. Either way, they can report him to the authorities and have done with him.

Jesus knows what they are up to. And their hypocrisy is blatant: they handle the graven image as they hold out the coin before him.

'Whose image is on the coin?' Jesus demands. They answer: 'Caesar's.'

And then as ever, Jesus infuriatingly doesn't answer their question!

He offers a sentence which has left them and us with brain ache ever since. "Give to the emperor the things that are the emperors and give to God the things that are God's."

So, what belongs to God? The whole creation, the earth and every creature in it, everything belongs to God. And the good book declares that each one of us, bears the image of God. The coin bears the image of the sovereign. We bear the image of God.

So, what belongs to God?

Well if God holds everything then we belong to God alone.

Yet what do we do with the various coins we like to call *our* money? How do we relate to *our* Government, *our* churches, *our* possessions, ...*our* golden calves? Like the Pharisees and the Herodians I want to give one thing to Caesar and another thing to my church, and another thing to my political allies, as if it all belongs *to me* in the first place!

Of course, some think we should simply separate politics and religion. Give Caesar what is his and give God what is Gods. Keep the worldly stuff out of the spiritual stuff. It's cleaner that way.

But Jesus is not interested in keeping it clean and he's not interested in the ways we try to twist his words to justify ourselves politically or religiously. He's not interested in our excuses. He wants *our whole lives*, he wants all our money, he demands all our allegiances and he desires all our love. He'll take our fears and even our sins. What we do with our whole selves and that includes our money, our taxes, our giving, and yes, our support of those who have fallen into debt: this is where it begins.

Soon Jesus will be arrested, tried and executed and everything in his short passionate life and death is political and everything in his eternal passionate life and death belongs fully to God.

Jesus, the one whose face, whose very self, reveals to us the face of God. The one who holds and reconciles *all* humanity, making peace between Herodians and Pharisees, Jews and Gentiles, male and female, rich and poor. Such love demands our all. Amen.
