Gospel Reading: Luke 2:22-40

When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, they brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord ²³(as it is written in the law of the Lord, 'Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord'), ²⁴and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, 'a pair of turtle-doves or two young pigeons.'

²⁵ Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. ²⁶It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. ²⁷Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, ²⁸Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying, ²⁹ 'Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace,

according to your word;

³⁰ for my eyes have seen your salvation,

³¹ which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples,

³² a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel.'

³³ And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. ³⁴Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, 'This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed ³⁵so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul too.'

³⁶ There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband for seven years after her marriage, ³⁷then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshipped there with fasting and prayer night and day. ³⁸At that moment she came, and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem.

³⁹ When they had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. ⁴⁰The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favour of God was upon him.

Reflection

We discover a lot about Jesus' parents in this short passage. They were faithful to their Jewish traditions so made the journey to the temple to have Jesus circumcised. A young mother who had recently given birth had been journeying for several days from Nazareth, to Bethlehem and then to Jerusalem. She must have been exhausted as she approached the grandeur of the Temple. It is not hard to imagine them talking about the way in which his birth has come about and all the signs and symbols that accompanied his arrival into the world.

These parents did not have much money, so they could not afford the lamb that was the normal sacrifice, instead they claimed the concession made in the Law for the poor and offered two pigeons or turtle-doves.

A daily routine affair in the life of the busy temple takes an unexpected turn. An elderly man and woman appear on the scene and take over. They had both been waiting a long time for this moment. The Holy Spirit had revealed to them that this child and their parents were special.

There is something important about the way they welcome and respect this exhausted couple. Without a moment's hesitation they get alongside them and they affirm them and their son. There is not the slightest doubt that this poor, tired family is going to be the instrument through which God brings salvation to the world.

Being open to the Spirit means that we must turn inside out so many of our expectations. Of course, we must reach out with compassion to those who are weak and vulnerable and many of our churches are good at doing this. We also need to be just as good at getting alongside people and listening to their stories, because in doing that we might discover God reaching out to us.

Jesus brings hope to the world because of the way he gets alongside people rather than the things he does for people.

So, these elders in the community, with all their prayerful patience and wisdom honour the child and his parents. In this struggling family they can not only see potential, but much more. They recognise the child for who he is.

Simeon offers thanksgiving to God and speaks a word of prophesy to the parents. Before his rising there will be a falling. That is the way God turns things inside out: there will be death before resurrection so a sword will pierce Mary's soul.

Anna talks of the hopes of all who are looking to be set free. She recognises that these hopes are tied up in the child.

So much hope and expectation is invested in this young couple who are entrusted with nurturing the Saviour of the world to maturity.

That is the way with God, who chooses the seemingly insignificant people to get caught up in achieving his purposes.
