Reflection

The passage we have read in Luke's gospel records how the risen Jesus came to his own when they were gathered together in the upper room.

The risen Lord was no ghost or hallucination. He was real. The Jesus Christ who died was indeed the same Jesus Christ who rose again. This is the sure and certain hope of the Gospel. Christianity is not founded on the dreams or wishes of men and women 2 thousand years ago, but on one who in actual historical fact was nailed to a cross taking upon himself the sin of the world; paying the price once for all that all people might know reconciliation with God for all eternity. This is the hope of the resurrection!

Now we can't understand this can we? We can't fully get our heads round this. In fact, there's a lot of things about God and about life that if we're completely honest, we cannot begin to understand. We cannot understand why sometimes people carry out the most horrendous acts of violence; we cannot understand why bad things happen to good people; we cannot understand why and how a virus can spread around the whole world and cause the deaths of millions of people. There is so much about life and faith that we simply cannot understand. And yet the reality of Christ's resurrection points us to a God who deals with life in a real and tangible way.

Jesus knew that these disciples were so shocked and frightened by seeing him again, he knew they needed some proof of his resurrection. He showed them his hands and feet, he said 'touch me and see for yourselves!' Even then they weren't convinced, so he took some of the fish that they were eating and ate it.

So much about being a Christian involves faith – trusting in God even when the way ahead is not clear or when everything and everyone around us says 'Really? Are you sure?' The writer of the book of Hebrews describes faith in this way – 'Faith is being sure of what we hope for, and certain of what we do not see.' Trusting God can seem risky. Trusting God can seem scary. Trusting God can seem crazy. And yet trusting God is the most liberating and faith building thing that we can ever do.

So yes, faith and trust are crucial to life as a Christian. We don't often have proof do we? But as Jesus knew these disciples fears and doubts, so too God knows each of our fears and doubts . When we genuinely say, as the disciple Thomas said, 'Lord, I believe, help my unbelief', God hears that prayer. What is it that you want God to show you today? Tell him. What words do you want to hear him speak to you? Tell him.

A friend of mine felt called into Methodist ministry, but he wasn't sure if he was hearing God right or not. He asked God to confirm this call through three different people saying to him that he should offer for the ministry. And sure enough, within a couple of weeks, without him saying anything to anyone, three completely different people had said to him that he should consider candidating for the ministry! We must not put God to the test, but I do believe that we can ask God for a sign of some sort to confirm something to us.

Our faith is rooted in reality – Christ's bodily resurrection, and the fact that God calls us to live in the reality of life. To live out our faith amidst the reality – often harsh, earthy, gritty reality of life. Where people hurt other people; where injustice often prevails and where life for so many makes no sense. God calls us to be a people of hope in a world of no hope. God calls us to be a people of love where hatred is rife; God calls us to be a people of peace where conflict rules.

And so I want to encourage each one of us today to be *real* with God about our faith. Let's not pretend. God knows us better than we know ourselves, so let's be real with God. Let's be real with each other. Let's share our concerns with each other, let's trust one another enough to maybe share the things we are struggling with.

That was a key part of John Wesley's Holy Club and the Methodist societies. They shared with each other the things they were finding hard in their lives. We just don't really do that these days do we? We don't like to hear the truth sometimes do we? But let's be people who trust one another and love one another enough to be able to speak the truth in love.

And let's get to grips with living out our faith in the real world, with all its mess, with all its diversity, with all its confusion. Let's allow the real, living hope of the resurrection to fill our hearts so much that people see something different about us, and are drawn to Christ – the one who loves them, died for them, was raised from the dead, and longs to give life in all its fullness, a real and lasting hope for all eternity and the very reason for life itself.
