Gathering Prayers

Declaration of Forgiveness

There is now no condemnation for those who live in union with Christ Jesus; for the law of the Spirit of life has set us free from the law of sin and death. **This is our salvation, this is our forgiveness. Let us live by this faith. Amen**

Reading: Hebrews 11 v 1, 8-16, 12 v 1-2 Listen for the word of God!

Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. Indeed, by faith our ancestors received approval.

By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to set out for a place that he was to receive as an inheritance; and he set out, not knowing where he was going. By faith he stayed for a time in the land he had been promised, as in a foreign land, living in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. For he looked forward to the city that has foundations, whose architect and builder is God. By faith he received power of procreation, even though he was too old—and Sarah herself was barren—because he considered him faithful who had promised. Therefore, from one person, and this one as good as dead, descendants were born, 'as many as the stars of heaven and as the innumerable grains of sand by the seashore.'

All of these died in faith without having received the promises, but from a distance they saw and greeted them. They confessed that they were strangers and foreigners on the earth, for people who speak in this way make it clear that they are seeking a homeland. If they had been thinking of the land that they had left behind, they would have had opportunity to return. But as it is, they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore, God is not ashamed to be called their God; indeed, he has prepared a city for them.

Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross, disregarding its shame, and has taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God.

Reflection

My recent Sabbatical involved lots of trips. I went to Manchester, to West Yorkshire, to the Midlands, Norfolk, Sussex and Devon to name but a few. Re-engaging with friends not seen in years. Wonderful times. After staying for a while in each place, I returned home. Following a trip, you always come back. A trip is not a journey, though the two are often confused. A journey is intentional, purposeful, and has some destination in view. The destination itself may not be a place, or may not be clear, but one sets out on a journey in order to ultimately cease journeying and to arrive, and likely to stay. On a trip you always come back. On a journey not.

We have all experienced differences in our journeys of faith to get to this point. And in recent times, our faith has been tested as we have and continue to live through turbulent times when things will never be as they were, and we do not yet know what will transpire. And this makes life difficult for us, uncomfortable, fractious...we do not always agree with each other, which is natural, and we respond with fear, or aggression, or timidity. So I remind myself and each one of us to see with the eyes of Christ and in each encounter on the journey, to speak and act as if to Christ himself.

The men and women for whom Hebrews was written were also facing an uncertain future. The writer wanted to encourage them to be faithful to Christ at a time when discipleship would be costly, when the future looked bleak by all accounts, but was ultimately unknown. They are reminded that through Christ they possess the blessings of the new covenant, made real in bread and wine. They are reminded that they are the heirs to the *utterly reliable promise of God*. But they are weary. Weary of the turbulent times, of sustaining their commitment to Christ. That is why in chapter 10, the writer reminds them of their former witness and urges them not to throw away their boldness.

What then follows is a list of exemplary witnesses to an enduring faith; a demonstration that faith is essentially determined by hope. The writer maps out the life of Abraham and declares that throughout the history of salvation, approval from God has been based upon evidence of a living faith *which acts in complete trust of God's promises*, even when the realisation of those promises is not in sight. This is dynamic, living faith, moving beyond disappointment and suffering, not afraid of failure, nor afraid to let go of the past. This is faith which testifies *by example* to future generations, to our dear children and their children - the reality of belief in promised blessings.

Abraham lived in the highly civilised city of Ur, a rich and fertile place, watered annually by the flooding of the Euphrates, which stood alone within a vast desert. Yet Abraham took a huge risk, obeying God's call and stepping out into that wilderness. He left what he knew, what was safe, and all that gave him comfort and a sense of belonging. The details were unclear to Abraham, but the faith he had in the God who called him - compelled him to respond.

His pilgrimage led him to alien places, uncomfortable and new challenges. <u>He</u> became the stranger, the guest in other's lands. No matter – he believed in and anticipated the promise of God. "For he was *looking forward* with certainty to the city which has foundations because its designer and creator is God." Abraham left one city for another. He exchanged a life of settled comfort for an existence marked by hardship and wandering in pursuit of the promise of God.

This kind of faith is directed toward the future. The forward-looking capacity of faith enables a person, or a community to advance courageously and confidently into an unseen future, supported by the word of God and the Spirit of Jesus.

It's rarely been more crucial in the life and history of our church, to seek to see with the eyes of Jesus. To lift our gaze and watch in the moment for the certain call from God to promises in which we can utterly trust. The current Circuit visioning process places many challenges before us. The journey continues as different things come in and out of focus. The vision is not yet fully known. But one thing is certain. We have been changed by the last 18 months and we are called to discern what God is calling us to *now*.

We're on a journey together. We are to run the race – with perseverance. So let us take the time to pause and think and pray before we immediately respond and react. Let us remember to watch with the eyes of Jesus. Let us lift our gaze and fix our eyes *on* Jesus, imitating his faith and trusting in him. He is both pioneer and perfector. He sits beside and simultaneously goes ahead. He leads the way and his enthronement in heaven secures the promises of God.

Faith boldly looks to the future, and acts in the here and now, trusting that the future is certain. It is guaranteed by the promise of the God who looks us in the eyes and who cannot lie.
