Romans 8:31-35,37-39

More Than Conquerors

31 What, then, shall we say in response to these things? If God is for us, who can be against us? **32** He who did not spare his own Son, but gave him up for us all—how will he not also, along with him, graciously give us all things? **33** Who will bring any charge against those whom God has chosen? It is God who justifies. **34** Who then is the one who condemns? No one. Christ Jesus who died—more than that, who was raised to life—is at the right hand of God and is also interceding for us. **35** Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall trouble or hardship or persecution or famine or nakedness or danger or sword?

37 No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. **38** For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, **39** neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord.

John 15:9-17

9 “As the Father has loved me, so have I loved you. Now remain in my love. **10** If you keep my commands, you will remain in my love, just as I have kept my Father’s commands and remain in his love. **11** I have told you this so that my joy may be in you and that your joy may be complete. **12** My command is this: Love each other as I have loved you. **13** Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one’s life for one’s friends. **14** You are my friends if you do what I command. **15** I no longer call you servants, because a servant does not know his master’s business. Instead, I have called you friends, for everything that I learned from my Father I have made known to you. **16** You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you so that you might go and bear fruit—fruit that will last—and so that whatever you ask in my name the Father will give you. **17** This is my command: Love each other.

SERMON

John 15:17 “This is my Command: Love each other”

I grew up with a brother and sister, both younger. I was fairly obedient, I would like to get things right. My brother was different. He would choose what he wanted to do, he worked out if he made people laugh, or if he was silly, he could get away with most things. My sister was shrewd, she watched, saw what worked, and then she could get away with things

because she knew how to play the game. Somehow she always 'needed' to go to the toilet, just as we had to do the washing up, so my brother and I ended up having to do it.

Why am I telling you this? Well it's about obedience. I didn't always get it right, but generally I tried to. There is an exception, of course. I deliberately disobeyed a new rule at school, and I went to play tennis with a friend in the girls quadrangle, because there was no where else to play. It didn't take long to get found out, and I got the cane from the headmaster. A poor choice of being disobedient, and I learnt my lesson.

Well, what might you ask, has playing tennis and getting into trouble, got to do with Remembrance Sunday? Well it's about obedience. This human behaviour, in its proper place can be very powerful, or it can be a weakness. Choosing when and where to be obedient is key.

Today, we bear witness, and give thanks to, those who were obedient, even to the point of death, under the most exacting and difficult circumstances. Their obedience in protecting the value of freedom, often cost the sacrifice of their own lives. For that we shall be forever thankful. They might not have known of Christ's statement in v.13, "Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends", but they did this for our sakes. Obedience, even when it tragically cost them their lives.

There are times when it is correct to be disobedient. For example, when being told to do things by bad people, including recently, bad police officers, or more often in some countries, corrupt officials, or leaders, or organisations. Sometimes it is about challenging the status quo, when it is the norm. At the moment we have a significant life threatening problem, which is the climate emergency. Being wise, and using wisdom, to do the right thing, and ultimately being the most loving, my require us in being disobedient. We might have to say NO, at times, when we would rather comply, and be obedient.

To move back to the readings, we all long for the day, "The last days", in Micah, when God's law will be established universally, when peoples and nations everywhere will, "Beat their swords into ploughshares and spears into running hooks". Then they will have, "no need to train for war".

Until that time, we have to accept the fullness of God's love, which is to be found in Jesus Christ. As the apostle Paul assures us, "nothing in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Jesus Christ".

Doing the right thing, is often a complex moral decision, but if we are led by the example of Jesus, then we can “Love each other, as He has loved us”. Jesus gives us this instruction as a command. Obedience in its highest form, *is* required.

Today we bear witness to, and give thanks for, those who have done this, with the greatest personal sacrifice, in so many different and difficult circumstances. Some of which have, “laid down their lives, for their friends”, and though they weren’t aware of it others as well, (including naughty school boys). The price of freedom can be very dear.

Today Jesus, we pledge our obedience to your command, that we “Love each other”. To the Glory of God, in the power of the Spirit. *Amen.*
